### THE EUCHARIST IN ACTION.

Although we are deprived of celebrating the Eucharist together at the moment, it is gratifying to know that so many are viewing Mass on-line from a variety of locations locally or around the world, and that they are most appreciative of the opportunity to do so. It isn't the same as being physically present of course, but it is perhaps the next best thing. As a priest, I am very conscious of the importance of the Eucharist as the centre of parish life and activity. This is why I am still celebrating Mass privately every day during the current closure of our churches. Through the celebration of daily Mass, it is Christ himself who breathes life into the parish and who is the beginning and the end of every parish endeavor. The priest, "in persona Christi" – in the person of Christ – facilitates the dynamic of parish life, and it is parish life that, in turn, gives birth to the different parish groupings and ministries, which produce life-long friendships and enduring community.

During the last four weeks of this Coronavirus Lockdown, I hear that so many parishioners of St. Joseph's and St. Mary's have been looking out for one another; some asking me if I know of anyone who needs help; others seeking out and providing that help where it is most needed. Many are just picking up the phone or using social media to establish that human contact which is so vital and so necessary. So although we cannot celebrate the Eucharist together, sacramentally, at this time, nonetheless we are showing that we are indeed a Eucharistic community by bringing the Eucharist TO LIFE in this way, during this period of crisis.

### DOUBTING THOMAS...

When The Risen Lord appeared to the disciples, who were huddled together in the upper room that evening in today's gospel, one of their number, Thomas, was missing. When Thomas arrives he refuses to believe what he hears. History has rather unkindly labelled him as "doubting" Thomas. Doubting Thomas he might have been, but at least *his* was an honest doubt. It was not enough for the group to profess *their* faith on his behalf. He could not shelter in a faith which he could not make his own. He may have wanted to believe it, but that wish just could not struggle into faith. Thomas was searching for conviction. For him, his faith had to be authentic; it had to be his own, or else he could not handle it. Thomas was lucky that the Risen Lord was on hand to dispel his doubts, by allowing him to touch the wounds in his hands and side. By doing that, in front of chosen witnesses, Jesus used the doubts of Thomas to dispel any doubts his followers-to-come might have.

In these dark days which have enveloped Easter 2020, and in the days that lie ahead, we may need our faith more than ever, not least as a bannister rail to hold onto. But if like Thomas, our faith is rooted in conviction, then we will see the face of the Risen Lord, even behind the gloomy headlines and the complexities of current predictions. (Mgr)
