A LENTEN REFLECTION BY MGR. BOARDMAN.

The weeks of Lent are slipping by. Here we are at Sunday Week 5 already, with Holy Week around the corner. With so many restrictions imposed on us by the Coronavirus Crisis – not least that our two churches have had to be closed down – we are unable to celebrate the Resurrection of the Lord together this Easter, which is unprecedented..

As the COVID-19 pandemic gathers pace around the world, bringing with it waves of sickness and death, people are being confronted with the reality of our own mortality, which under normal circumstances, is something we prefer not to think about. So today's Gospel reading has something very important and timely to say to us about the crisis situation we find ourselves in at this moment in time.

THE RAISING OF LAZARUS FROM THE DEAD is about Jesus coming into a tragic situation and transforming that situation. "If you had been there (Martha said to Jesus) this would not have happened". How often that statement of Martha's has been echoed down through time – whether it was someone struggling to come to terms with the death of a loved one, or in the case of a particularly tragic death, someone agonising over the needlessness and absurdity of it all.

Even though we know that death is part of the very mystery of life, nevertheless, the human spirit recoils from the idea that life should be "snuffed out" like a candle. It regards death as an intruder; an unwelcome visitor which makes a mockery of our lives, our hopes, and our plans for the future. And so, faced with Lazarus' death, Jesus came face to face with his own impending death. And he was prepared to confront it because he believed intensely that through his own death, God the Father was going to make a definitive statement to the world and to mankind, ONCE AND FOR ALL, about suffering and death.

The form that statement was to take, would change the world forever..... RESURRECTION and life after death. The raising of Lazarus from the dead was just the prelude to the PASCHAL MYSTERY which we celebrate, in the resurrection of Jesus from the dead on Easter Sunday. Belief in Jesus and belief in his resurrection will not take away our tears. Human tragedies will continue to happen – personal tragedies will still punctuate our own lived from time to time. But if we can bring the presence of Jesus into these situations, as Martha and Mary did that day, then he can transform them so that they become for us – not so much a crisis of ffaith, but rather an opportunity for faith.
